FIGHTING POVERTY IN OUR COMMUNITY

Poverty comes in many forms, including hunger and malnutrition, limited access to essential services, social discrimination and more. Many of the residents our department serves fall under this category*, which is why the work we do and the services we provide are so important to the Columbus community.

January is Poverty in America Awareness Month and a good time to reconnect with how our department aims to provide equitable and accessible services to all our community members. How do we go about doing this? Below are some examples of the services we provide.

Throughout the year, community members can:

- Enjoy free art exhibits at the Priscilla R. Tyson Cultural Arts Center
- Spend time outdoors by visiting any of our over 400 parks
- Participate in sports leagues at an affordable cost
- Join the APPS Job Readiness Program to gain valuable career skills and paid work experience

Our Food Office provides:

- Free after-school meals
- Free mobile produce markets
- Food boxes for the senior population
- Meals for youth during the summer

Our community centers offer:

- Free after-school programming
- Wellness and recreation classes at affordable costs
- Playgrounds and sports courts

During the summer community members can:

- Enjoy free concerts at our parks
- Visit our pools for just \$1 per person
- Visit our free splash pads throughout the City
- Take advantage of our low- and no-cost summer camps

IMPORTANT DATES

- World Braille Day (Jan. 4): This day aims to increase awareness of the importance of braille as a means of communication in fully realizing the human rights of blind and visually impaired people. The date for the event was chosen by the United Nations General Assembly and marks the birthday of Louis Braille, creator of this writing system.
- Martin Luther King Jr. Day (Jan. 15): Observed on the third Monday of January each year, this federal holiday celebrates the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. King was the chief spokesperson for nonviolent activism in the Civil Rights Movement, which protested racial discrimination in federal and state law. King was assassinated in 1968. The holiday was signed into law in 1983 and was first observed on Jan. 20, 1986.
- International Holocaust Remembrance Day (Jan. 27): This day commemorates the victims of the Holocaust, which resulted in the genocide of one-third of the Jewish people by Nazi Germany between 1933 and 1945. In 2005, the United Nations General Assembly designated Jan. 27 as a day of commemoration because it was the date when the Auschwitz concentration camp was liberated in 1945.
- Black History Month (February): This annual observance celebrates Black history and culture. Black educators and Black United Students (BUS) at Kent State University first proposed Black History Month in February 1969, before holding the first celebration at Kent State Jan. 2-Feb. 28, 1970. President Gerald Ford officially recognized Black History Month in 1976 during the celebration of the U.S. Bicentennial. Black History Month is observed in Canada during February, and in Ireland and the United Kingdom in October.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS REGARDING PAID TIME OFF (PTO)

Don't forget these important reminders regarding your time off benefits:

- **Personal Business Days Deadline:** All existing personal business days for 2023 must be used by Jan. 20, 2024. Any unused personal business days after this date will be forfeited.
- **Use-It-or-Lose-It Vacation Time**: If you find yourself at the "use-it-or-lose-it" stage with vacation accruals, use that accrued vacation time by Jan. 20, 2024, to avoid any loss of earned benefits.
- Changes for CWA and MCP Members: Starting Jan. 21, 2024, vacation days, personal days and birthday holidays for CWA and MCP members will be combined into one bank of time known as Paid Time Off (PTO). This consolidation eliminates separate allocations for personal days and birthday holidays. The accrual of PTO will be calculated per pay period based on the number of your full-time years. The rate you accrue each pay period will be very similar to the current accrual rates for vacation days, personal days and birthday holidays.

Please ensure that your remaining birthday holiday and any outstanding personal days are used by Jan. 20, 2024, as any unused time will be forfeited.

COLD TEMPERATURES ARE GREAT FOR WATCHING OUR FEATHERED FRIENDS

Winter is an exciting time for birding-northern cardinals and blue jays are quite striking against a snowy backdrop! Just like in the spring and summer, many bird species are only visible in Ohio during the winter, such as white-throated sparrows, brown creepers, golden-crowned kinglets and even bald eagles. Whether you take a walk in your local park or simply observe birds at a feeder, you will find a wide variety of birds actively searching for food to help keep them warm this winter.

It's not too late to participate in the 124th <u>Christmas Bird Count</u>, which began as a result of scientists and bird enthusiasts becoming concerned about the declining bird populations due to Christmas hunting. The Christmas Bird Count is used to protect bird species and their habitats. The department recently held a Christmas Bird Count at the Griggs Reservoir area, where 11 birder participants counted 881 total individual birds, spanning 51 total species!
